

Although I like the idea of this book, I did think that perhaps there were too many stories, as I struggled to remember them all. However, I really liked the story about the girl with her imaginary friend.


I would recommend this book to my friends, as one of the key themes of the book is friendship.


I felt that the book was a little too long, with some of the poems not making sense. Also the use of some `bad` words spoilt the theme of `respect` and `equality` for me slightly.
